CONNECTING WITH GOD

From Pastor Hahn

My dear Immanuel church family:

“God is good, all the time! All the time, God is good!” That is one of the chants young Lutheran used to learn in Confirmation camp.

As people of God, we know this to be true. We believe it in our hearts, know it in our minds, and feel it in our souls. And, as people of faith, our trust and faith in God are not shaken when bad things happen to good people.

We remain steadfast because we know that pain, death, suffering, and injustice will not have the last word. Our God of life, our God of resurrection, new life, second chances, and new beginnings has the last word. The God of unconditional love and justice for all has the last word.

Admittedly, such convictions can be shattered when we are bombarded with images and news that show catastrophes—like the floods in Germany, Belgium, Austria, and Holland or the massive wildfires and serious drought in parts of the U.S. Those convictions are

challenged when pain and death become personal in our own households. Many of us deal with health challenges and the Camburn and Mitchell families mourn the loss of loved ones.

However, the good news, God’s news, is already discernible, even in pain, even in death, even in destruction.

For example, despite the occasional “disaster tourist” hoping to get a picture of the destruction, many ordinary Germans kicked into high gear with hands-on help, with donations of food, clothing, and money. They were loving their neighbors.

**God is good
all the time!**

Also, after years of either denying that climate change (global warming) is real and slow walking any meaningful national response to it, the Germans are, finally, waking up. They are beginning to realize that Nature, God’s Creation, cannot be used and abused without repercussions.

“Something must be done”, German leaders from all mainstream parties seem to agree now, “to slow down the warming of the earth. After all, there is NO Planet B.” It will be interesting to see if the Green Party will gain votes in the upcoming elections.

What I found remarkably interesting was the conversation around money. Clearly, responding to the aftermath of the flooding, – repairing, and rebuilding – will be awfully expensive. (Unfortunately, the human lives lost cannot be replaced, and they are priceless.)



But, repairing and rebuilding after a catastrophe is MORE expensive than investing in preventing them in the first place. According to one expert, every Euro that is NOT invested in prevention, i.e., actions that limit global warming, will lead to between two to eleven Euros of clean-up and rebuilding costs afterwards.

Speaking of action: Would it not be great if our congregation could send a significant donation of support to a Lutheran congregation in one of the affected areas in Germany?

Finally, pray that more leaders all over the world will begin to see, as clearly as the Germans, that big action in response to global warming is needed!

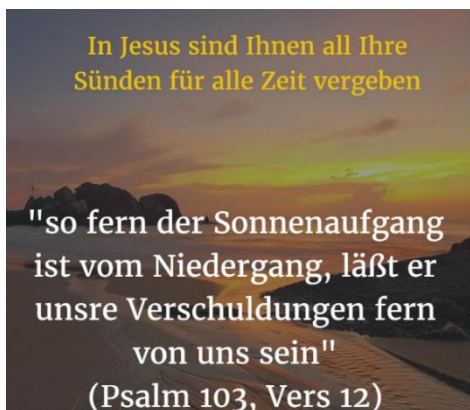
Man sagt diesen Satz doch meistens dann, wenn jemandem ein Missgeschick passiert. Und indem man das sagt, vermutet man, dass hinter dem, was da schiefgelaufen ist, eine böse Absicht steckte. Also zum Beispiel, wenn jemand einen Luftballon mit Wasser füllt und der platzt, bevor man ihn auf jemanden werfen kann, um man wird selbst nass. Aber steckte hinter dem Vorhaben, mit dem Ballon zu werfen, tatsächlich eine böse Absicht? Oder war es einfach ein harmloses Spiel?

Ich mag den häufigen Gebrauch des Wortes Sünde nicht. Wenn jemand die eigene Diät bricht und dabei sagt: "Heute sündige ich mal", hat das sehr wenig damit zu tun, was das Christentum unter Sünde versteht.

Eine Sünde zu begehen bedeutet, sich durch eine schlimme Tat absichtlich von Gott zu entfernen. Die erste Sünde, von der ausdrücklich in der Bibel steht, ist der Mord von Kain an seinem Bruder Abel. Über solche Kategorien reden wir.

Der Spruch von den "kleinen Sünden" sagt ja auch noch etwas anderes, und darauf gehen Sie in Ihrer Frage auch ein: Wenn Gott die kleinen Sünden sofort bestraft, wann bestraft er dann die großen? Später, natürlich.

Und so kommen wir schnell auf das Jüngste Gericht, auf die Hölle und ewige Strafen. Mit denen zu drohen, hat schon immer denen geholfen, die wollten, dass andere Leute das tun, was sie selbst für richtig hielten. Ein geschicktes Druckmittel, mit dem man anderen Angst machen kann.

Der wichtigste christliche Glaubenssatz lautet aber nicht: Du wirst für deine Sünden büßen müssen, sondern: Jesus Christus hat die Sünden aller Menschen auf sich genommen.

Ja, es gibt die Vorstellung von der Hölle noch – auch in den evangelischen Kirchen. Wer aber ständig von der Hölle redet, verkehrt das, was Jesus Christus gelehrt hat, ins Gegenteil. Der sprach nämlich meistens vom Reich Gottes!

Darum sollten wir in vielerlei Hinsicht vorsichtig sein, wenn es um die Sünde geht. Weder sollten wir so tun, als könnten wir tun und lassen, was wir wollen, noch sollten wir ständig von Sünde reden, wenn wir von einer Regelübertretung sprechen.

Wir sollten uns überlegen, ob wir die Hölle vor allem deswegen gut finden, weil wir andere dort schmoren sehen wollen.

Wir sollten und klar machen, dass kein Mensch jemals ohne Sünde sein kann, sondern dass wir alle auf Vergebung angewiesen sind. Und darum sollten wir selbst vergeben.

We're BACK!!

We are pleased to report that the Lower Moreland Board of School Directors recently voted to approve the rental agreement with the Immanuel German School! Let's all work together to Build Back Better. We are proud to announce that Immanuel German School will begin its **47th** year providing instruction in the German language and culture to children, young adults, and adults throughout the greater Delaware Valley on September 11, 2021.

We know that this past year has been difficult on so very many levels. We truly thank each and every one of you who has stayed with us. Parents, students, and colleagues: We know it hasn't been easy, nor has it been as much *fun*. We really miss seeing you each Saturday, and the small picture on a computer screen was hardly a substitute.

As you know from our spring newsletter, in spite of the pandemic and the remote learning, several of our students have still managed to complete the *Deutsches Sprachdiplom* on levels I and II. Many more participated in the two tests leading up to the *Sprachdiplom*: the *Internationale schulische Vergleicharbeit* A1 and A2, and still more in the National German Exam, where they earned a total of 33 medals and awards: 12 Gold, 7 silver, 6 bronze and 8 achievement. Several of our students also just completed the AP German Language and Culture Exam. Each of these achievements serves as proof that our students are really learning German, and each certificate can and should be shared with your child's regular school and be part of the school record. This strong and comprehensive testing program is just one aspect that distinguishes us from all the other schools or organizations that may offer some German classes.

Please help us spread the word. **We're back!** If we want to build back better, we need your help. Please don't ask, "When's the last day to sign up and pay?" but "**When can we register?**" If we are going to continue to offer the best German program around, we need you. We need students. We truly appreciate the many donations we receive, but if our classrooms were full that would be even better. Please remember that if your family was hard hit financially during the pandemic, please don't be shy – several generous donors have made it possible for us to offer full and/or partial scholarships.

Anticipating a return to IGS on the part of some of the students who did not return during the pandemic, we would like to announce that there will be no increase in tuition for students who register and pay before August 4.
