CONNECTING WITH GOD

From Pastor Hahn:

My dear Immanuel church family,

April promises to be a very special month in the life of our church family. I can feel the anticipation in the air. Some great experiences await us.

First of all, there is Holy Week. Beginning with Palm/Passion Sunday on April 10, we walk with Jesus into Jerusalem and participate with him in the institution of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday and his crucifixion on Good Friday.



I have said it many times before and I will stress it again: Your experience of Easter will be much more meaningful and joyful if you participate in the worship experiences of Holy Week.

Secondly, there is the celebration of Easter both on Easter Saturday with the Easter Vigil after sundown and then the celebrations on Easter Sunday. In the midst of the deadly carnage inflicted by the Russian army on the people of Ukraine, it is good to hear that God's "yes" to life is louder and stronger than death.

Thirdly, you and I will mark another milestone in our relationship: It was on Easter 2016 that I officially began my ministry with you. So, "Happy Sixth Anniversary" to all of us.

Fourthly, as a church family we will be launching our ministry and mission into what is called "the post-pandemic reality." Much like the fall of the Berlin Wall and the events of 9/11, the pandemic has created a different environment, especially for religious organizations.

The de-churching of America has only taken on steam during the pandemic, and our society's interest and culture's openness to the kind of faith practices we take for granted is waning. But there is hope as the council learned in its continuing education with churches in Canada.

In this postpandemic environment, all members' and friends' skills, time, talent, and generosity will be



needed for our congregation to recapture the upward path we were on before the pandemic struck. This includes you, dear reader! Everyone can do something! And: training and coaching will be available.

Fifthly, while we gently need to experiment with some ways to strengthen our congregation, some of the familiar will return. On Sunday mornings at 9:30 AM we will have INDOOR worship in English and at 11:00 AM INDOOR worship in German. Twice a month, we will also have INDOOR worship in English at 6:30 PM. (A special gift will be used to make arrangements to "live-stream" these services in high quality.)

Blessings on the remainder of your Lenten journey and your walk with Jesus into Jerusalem to the cross and to the empty tomb! Happy Easter!

Eine Präses mahnt zum Frieden

"Genug Tote, genug Verletzte, genug fürs Leben Traumatisierte, auch unter den russischen Soldaten,

genug Zerstörung in Charkiw und Mariupol und in den anderen Städten", sagte die Präses der Evangelischen Kirchen von Westfalen und die Ratsvorsitzende der Evangelische Kirche in Deutschland (EKD), Annette Kurschus, am 20.3. in der



Johanneskirche im hessischen Eltville am Rhein. "Es ist längst viel zu viel."

Kurschus erklärte, die Menschen hofften auf ein Einlenken: "Es ist genug. Wie gern würden wir diesen Satz hören aus Präsident Putins Mund." Der russische Präsident sei kein Krieger für eine heilige Sache und auch kein Prophet, der gegen die Sünde kämpfe. Es sei deshalb "kaum zu ertragen", was der russischorthodoxe Patriarch Kyrill kürzlich in einer Predigt gesagt habe, erklärte Kurschus.

Das Oberhaupt der Russisch-Orthodoxen Kirche, Kyrill I., hatte sich in der Predigt hinter den russischen Präsidenten Wladimir Putin gestellt und die Kriegshandlungen in der Ukraine als Verteidigung "traditioneller christlicher Werte" befürwortet. Die lutherischen Kirchen in Polen und Deutschland appellieren hingegen an den Patriarchen, sich für ein Ende des Ukraine-Russland-Konflikts einzusetzen.

In ihrer Predigt verwies die EKD-Ratsvorsitzende zudem auf den biblischen Propheten Elia, der in die Wüste geflohen und Gott angefleht habe, seine Seele zu sich zu nehmen. "Heute würde man ihn vermutlich einen Fanatiker nennen", sagte Kurschus. Er habe seinen Gott bis aufs Blut verteidigt und dafür getötet.

In der Wüste jedoch werde Elia zu einem ausgebrannten Krieger, "selbst zerstört von der Zerstörung, die er angerichtet hat", sagte die Theologin. In seinem Eingeständnis an Gott "Es ist genug" stecke aber auch ein Funken Hoffnung: "Es wird ein Ende geben - und einen Neuanfang."

Vor zwei Tagen hatte Kurschus im Berliner Dom zusammen mit Geistlichen verschiedener Konfessionen der Opfer des Ukraine-Krieges gedacht. "Wir denken an den Schmerz und das Leid der Opfer dieses entsetzlichen Krieges", sagte Kurschus. Sie würdigte jene Priester des Moskauer Patriarchats, die sich in einer Unterschriftenaktion gegen den Krieg und die Position ihrer Kirchenleitung gestellt haben, sowie die Aktivisten der inzwischen verbotenen russischen Menschenrechtsorganisation Memorial und die vielen Hilfswilligen, "die jetzt Hände reichen und Geflüchteten Zuflucht geben".

Die EKD-Auslandsbischöfin Petra Bosse-Huber sagte: "Unsere Solidarität, unser Mitgefühl und unser Gebet gilt den Menschen in der Ukraine und auch allen ökumenischen Geschwistern, die in der Ukraine, in Russland, in Belarus und weltweit ihre Stimme gegen diesen Angriffskrieg erhoben haben."

Der russische Angriffskrieg gegen die Ukraine hat laut UN bislang rund zehn Millionen Menschen in die Flucht getrieben. Dabei handelt es sowohl um Binnenvertriebene als auch um Menschen, die die Ukraine verlassen haben, wie der UN-Hochkommissar für Flüchtlinge, Filippo Grandi, per Twitter mitteilte.

Er betonte, dass diejenigen, die Kriege beginnen, für das Leiden der Zivilisten die Verantwortung trügen. In

Deutschland sind mittlerweile deutlich mehr als 200.000 ukrainische Kriegsflüchtlinge angekommen (Stand am 20.3.).

UPDATED COVID-19 Safety Protocols

The Congregation Council approved the following "Phase 1" changes to begin on Sunday, April 3:

- Sunday INDOOR services (with simultaneous live streaming) will be at 9:30 AM (English) and 11:00 AM (in German).
- There will INDOOR evening services (with simultaneous live streaming) twice a month.
- Windows and doors will no longer be open during the service.
- Worshipers may seat themselves. Social distancing is encouraged. (Every other pew will be available.)
- Masks are encouraged.
- Use of hand sanitizer upon entry into the building.
- Holy Communion will continue with individual cups. (Available in the narthex/lobby.)
- Offering plates will be available near the entrance/exit doors.
- Elevator use is possible upon request.

After 30 days, the Congregation Council will assess how well Phase 1 is working and discuss steps for Phase 2, including food prep and use in the building, groups meeting during the week, and more.
